

The Board observe that this stamp has had applied to it the puncturing process similar to that which Mr Archer's invention is intended to effect and it is therefore desirable to trace this matter as far as possible." Intialled, presumably prepared by Ormond Hill, as there is also a roughly scripted version of this reply on a further page attached to the letter with the initials "OH" at the conclusion. The existence of this unofficial perforated stamp would no doubt have had significant implications for the ongoing financial negotiations the Inland Revenue were having, at the time, with Henry Archer for his machine and patent. An important document demonstrating Official knowledge of privately perforated adhesives. Cert. BPA (2001). Remark: Willcocks noted: "van Colle & (R.M.) Phillips fought for this, van Colle won at GBP 550, which must have been before 1964".



1853, Original Henry Archer signed document, dated 18 March 1853, regarding the Treasury Payment for his machine and invention, addressed to George F. Muntz MP for Birmingham, who had chaired the House of Commons Select Committee, the draft letter outlines Archer's disappointment with the offer received. A unique and historically important document. *Transcript:*

"I feel persuaded that when Mr Gladstone is informed that the first offer of a pecuniary nature which the late Government made to me was £1000 and £300 a year for 14 years he will not consider me unreasonable for declining to accept the one he with every desire to do me justice was pleased to propose because in point of fact instead of its being £1000 more than the offer of the late Government as he intended and supposed, it is £1000 less - Mr Gladstone has been led to suppose that the offer of the late Government was £3000 but I can assure you that no such offer was ever made to me or in point of fact any other offers than the £1000 - £300 per annum with the exception of the one made to me in december last by the Marquis of Chandos - I have therefore to request that you be so good as to explain all this to Mr Gladstone the first time you have an opportunity of speaking with him on the subject.

Faithfully yours Henry Archer"

The Invention of Stamp Perforation



Imperforate postage stamps, as officially issued in Britain from 6 May 1840, were typically scissor-cut from the sheet at the point of sale - estimated to take 15 minutes for a complete sheet of 240 labels.

Some Post Offices partially separated strips in advance of sale, using various cutting instruments, such as a razor, other open blades or rotary knives.

If scissors or knives were not at hand, improvised separation was implemented, such as tearing along a straight edge, or tearing against a person's thumbnail. This was obviously not ideal and would in many cases produce irregular and haphazard results, notwithstanding the time implications. Another objection to the system of separation by the use of knives, rotary knives or razors was that books, desks and tables were usually used by the Post Office clerks as a base for cutting the stamps, which led to the injury of the article whereon the cutting process was effected.



The vision

The first person who had the vision of a method to easily separate stamps from a sheet without tools like knives, razors or scissors was the Irish inventor Henry Archer. Archer's first invention was a rouletting machine stitching small cuts into the paper between the stamps to facilitate separation simply by hand. He demonstrated first trials to Post Office officials in October 1847.

But the table on which the sheets were laid to be rouletted suffered excessive wear. Similar problems arose with a second machine and Archer decided to abandon this approach of rouletting. Henry Archer's final idea was a 'Perforation Machine' punching little holes in the margins between the stamps. The machine was constructed with a gauge comb consisting of 16 perforation pins punching 16 holes in a horizontal line of two centimetres.

After some early trials on plain paper, Archer requested entire sheets of 240 from the Post Office to demonstrate

his invention on the original postage stamps in public use. The first Archer-perforated stamps are reported to have been used between January and August 1850 in London. An experimental 'country' distribution to Post Offices in Devon commenced in October 1850.

These first experiments turned out to be successful and the Post Office started to negotiate with Henry Archer for the purchase of his patented invention of a 'perforation machine'. Since the final decision of the purchase of the perforation machine patent had to be approved by Parliament, it was decided to start the distribution and sale of the newly perforated stamps at the post office counter of the House of Commons.

Archer's intention was to convince the Members of Parliament about the benefit of his invention and to vote for the acquisition of his patent!




Fig. 2: Printed pamphlet.

This experimental distribution of Archer's trial perforated stamps was realised during the 1851 Parliamentary Session. Upon distribution at the House of Commons Post Office counter, a printed information pamphlet was distributed to the Members of Parliament which was reprinting from an article that appeared in The Times newspaper on 20th October 1847 (**Fig. 2**).

It was headed "PERFORATED POSTAGE LABEL STAMPS - ADVANTAGES OF THE INVENTION"; the article referred to the apparent problems of separating stamps from the Post Office sheets and explained the advantages of the newly perforated stamps:

"....the patentee invented a Machine for perforating sheets of postage labels stamps, whereby, one or more stamps may be instantly detached without the use of knife or scissors, while the sheets, or any portion of a sheet may be readily folded up, so as to render them peculiarly convenient for the pocket.....".

The bottom line reads: "Perforated labels may now be had at the House of Commons".

Henry Grattan junior, Member of Parliament for Meath,

Ireland, was so impressed by the invention of the perforated postage stamp that he sent the pamphlet as a letter franked with an Archer perforated stamp he purchased at the House of Commons on 22 March 1851 to his wife Mary Grattan at 84 Stephens Inn, Dublin, Ireland (**Fig. 3**) and (**i**).


Later that year, the stamp distributor of the House of Commons stated:

"....they (the perforated stamps) were very highly approved by the Members; the sale (of stamps) was very considerably increased thereby., and a very general desire prevailed to possess the perforated labels both within and without the House...."

On 21st May 1852 a specially appointed "Select Committee" under the Chairmanship of Geroge Frederick Muntz, Member of Parliament, recommended that "the machine constructed by Mr. Archer, and his rights as patentee, should be purchased for the use of the public."

Finally, Henry Archer agreed to sell his patent for the Perforation machine to the Post Office for £4,000.00 in June 1853.




