Great Britain "Victorian Mixed Franking Covers" The Ray Simpson Collection

Almost exactly 10 years ago to the day, at STAMPEX 2014, Karl Louis suggested to Ray Simpson that he might like to write a book about Victorian mixed-franking covers. A challenging subject on many counts, not least because it is a topic which had not been adequately tackled before and it is a facet of collecting which cannot be conveniently slotted into a stamp catalogue. However, the idea greatly appealed to Ray because a study of mixed-franking covers brings together the two traditional philatelic disciplines of stamp collecting and postal history and adds to the knowledge of both. In 2020 Ray and Karl successfully published 'Great Britain Victorian Mixed-Franking Covers Illustrating Postage Stamp Development'.

It has without doubt become a great addition to the philatelic library and perhaps most usefully has given greater context to why certain stamps were produced, how they were used and indeed the extent to which particular stamps were used in combination with others and the frequency of such occurrences. This provides a commentary on the adequacy or otherwise of the stamps to fulfil their purpose, and for collectors to appreciate the scarcity and rarity of such frankings.

The book, like the collection on offer, also provides a more visual element to the equation. Aesthetics has also been an intrinsic facet of collecting and the subject of mixed-frankings is a fantastic way to illustrate both ends of the spectrum. There are, as with other areas of study, pivotal points where rarity does not equate to beauty. That is to say, the rare or important won't perhaps be described by our American friends as eye candy. However, on the other hand, mixed-frankings, by their very nature, pull together various stamp issues onto one canvas which often results in a collision between rarity and beauty. For example, there's the elegance of an 1840 1 d. Black used on a cover with an 1841 1 d. Red-brown, giving a classic line engraved combination which many collectors find irresistible, albeit they are not readily available. And, who could deny that an 1858 cover from London to Canada boasting a spectacular five colour combination franking is not a thing of beauty? Mind you, if it doesn't meet your visual approval it will tick the rarity box because it is the largest number of different values and colours on a pre-UPU cover recorded in the Karl Louis card index.

Putting aesthetics to one side for a moment, our hobby always seems to throw up the unassuming looking item which at first glance doesn't turn any heads. Mixed-frankings is no exception to this. But a head that was turned for what appears to be a very ordinary cover was the head of legendary collector Lady Mairi Bury, who spotted the 1855 2 d. Blue plate 4 used on cover in combination with 1858 2 d. Blue plate 7 and as common as it might look to most, she recognised its unique qualities. If it's romance you are looking for, then one of the lots, which is illustrated on the front cover of Ray and Karl's book, is sometimes referred to as the 'Princess and the Palace cover front' on account of the addressee. It is rather attractively franked with a rare Victorian 5 shilling stamp from the 1884/1901 issue in combination with the King Edward VII stamps issued just a few days earlier. As mixed-frankings go, it does bring beauty and rarity together yet again, with an air of mystery to what might have been in the package.

As with the aforementioned covers, most of the items being offered are featured within the book, many of which are illustrated, particularly those which are now known to be important, unique or one of a handful recorded. The fact that the lots in this auction are intrinsically intertwined with the book on the subject, as well as Ray's passion to bring it to life, it makes this sale both of a high-degree of appeal to philatelists and postal historians alike, but also an important opportunity to acquire the very covers that underpin much of the context for the definitive work on Victorian mixed-franking covers.

Mixed Frankings of the Victorian Issues of Great Britain - Items of Philatelic and Postal History

When the book 'Great Britain Victorian Mixed-Franking Covers Illustrating Postage Stamp Development' by Ray Simpson & Karl Louis was published in 2020, it was clear at first sight that a work of research and documentation had been created that went far beyond a description of rare stamps and covers. Thanks to the knowledge and expertise of the authors, a publication had been created that looks at mixed frankings of the Victorian issues of Great Britain (including postal stationery) within the context of the development of the postage stamp, and against the background of the changes and developments of the time - beginning with the world's first stamp, the 'Penny Black', up to the end of the 19th century.

Many of the items shown in the book come from Ray Simpson's private collection, which will be offered as part of the forthcoming Corinphila series of auctions at the end of November. These covers show a complex approach to collecting, but also the possibilities offered by mixed frankings. Interpreting the special features of the possible combinations in detail on the basis of selected items, and viewing them in the context of (philatelic) history is a challenging endeavour, which this collection achieves with flying colours, and in so doing it fascinates the observer.

In the beginning there was the postage stamp...

The starting point was the 'Penny Black', the world's first postage stamp, which still exudes a special fascination today. At the same time, the first item of postal stationery, the 'Mulready' envelopes and letter sheets, were introduced, which arrived at post office counters at the same time. And so the starting signal was given for the first British mixed frankings, which were to be followed by many more.

With the stamp and postal stationery issues that followed over the years, not only did the appearance of the stamps change, but the progress made in the area of production can also be clearly documented. To this day, the introduction of perforation is inextricably linked with the postage stamp, and a wide variety of combinations of imperforate and perforated issues are possible.



The world's first postal stationery item, a 1d Mulready envelope of 1840, with a 'Penny Red' (1d. Red-Brown of 1844) dated 24 March 1845. 1d. Mulready postal stationery envelopes in combination with the 1d. Red, used after 1844 with a numbered cancellation, are very rare. 


In addition to printing and production-related matters, the changes to the design are also an exciting area. The depictions of Queen Victoria were adapted with almost every new issue or series. The various combinations offer a wide range, with mixed frankings of several different issues, values and colours on one item being particularly rare and attractive.

It is easy to see that aspects of postal history are just as important as the philatelic aspects when looking at these items. In many cases, it is almost essential to look beyond the stamp to the history of the post and of communications in order to fully appreciate the individual items. Every cover is part of a story and the correct classification and consideration in its particular context is what makes this collection so exciting.


Almost every cover is a reflection of the development of the postage stamp and the covers document various aspects of postal and philatelic history. In this respect there should be something for everyone, from lovers of British classics to postal historians and from ordinary collectors to postal stationery specialists.

The Duke, the Pedigree of a Shorthorn Bull and a Transitional Cover

t never occurred to me when I began a career in . philately that I'd be writing about a 2,520 pound three year old bull called Duke of Northumberland, However, the rather nice turned cover, which features the 1840 1 d. Black franked with an 1841 1 d. Red has led me in this exact direction. This is because when you open the letter sheet up it is in fact a printed and extensive account of the 'Pedigree' of the champion Shorthorn bull named 'Duke of Northumberland'. This bulky fellow, which we shall call 'The Duke' was recognised as the Champion bull of England in 1842, and its owner, one Thomas Bates (1775–1849), a cattle breeder from North Yorkshire, was very proud of this bull

Let me put it this way. Mr Bates has gone into such detail about the family line and history of The Duke he'd give Greg Todd a run for his money when it comes to Provenance. On a serious note, this cover might not weigh a ton but it is a lovely illustration of the transition from the penny black to the penny red. And, if I was Thomas Bates I'd also be telling you that fewer than 40 covers are recorded with 1 d. black and 1 d. red in combination; of which 20 are redirected and 3 are turned covers. 'The Duke' example is the only turned and redirected example known. It's ex The Chartwell Collection. If you have a particular interest in shorthorn bulls then I can thoroughly recommend Mr Bates's account of The Duke. If not, then this transitional cover has many other appealing features which as a philatelist who loves to write about philatelic material. I can without any hesitation also thoroughly advocate. Fewer than 40 covers recorded with 1 d. black and 1 d. red in combination; of which 20 are redirected and 3 are turned covers. This is the only turned and redirected example known.

Note: The Shorthorn bull, Duke of Northumberland, was considered to be the crowning achievement of Thomas Bates, as a cattle breeder from North Yorkshire. It was recognised as the Champion bull of England in 1842. Its weight at three years and eight months was 2520 pounds.

The Unique Lady and Her Collection

Lady Mairi Bury (1921–2009) was an eminent philatelist who owned some of the rarest stamps and covers in the world. Her collection sold for more than £3m and included over 2000 lots. However, what you notice most about her buying habits and taste when thumbing through the past auction catalogues is not so much the value of the items, but the importance or significance. Lady

Mairi Bury had an eye for the unique. She knew her topic and hunted out the scarce, unusual and fine quality material. It didn't need to be valuable or expensive. It was more about the context and stories. Take the unassuming cover which is franked with two single 2 d. Blues, which boasts the Provenance of ex Lady Mairi Bury collection. Doesn't look like much on the surface, but on

closer inspection it is franked with two different issues.

An 1855 plate 4 perf. 14, wmk. small crown, in combination with 1858 2 d. blue, plate 7, perf. 14, wmk, large crown. Referring to the book 'Great Britain Victorian Mixed Franking Covers', by Ray Simpson & Karl Louis, it is illustrated on page 110 (fig. 159) and in reading a bit more you discover

it is one of five recorded covers with this combination of SG23 and SG45. But, more importantly it is a unique example of plate 4 used with plate 7. It's a reminder that Lady Mairi Bury, who began collecting stamps from the age of 8 years, was indeed a proper philatelist. We might even describe her as a 'classic stamp collector'. Certainly, her knowledge was sublime and for this she was

elected a fellow of the Royal Philatelic Society London. Certainly, whenever her name appears on the Provenance of an item it is a signal to many collectors to look just a bit closer than normal. Perhaps we should call her 'The Unique Lady'? Will be offered in the sale of "Great Britain Victorian Mixed Franking Covers - The Ray Simpson Collection"



Great Britain Experimental Machine Postmarks 1857-1901

The Jerry H. Miller International Gold Medal Collection

Great Britain was the first country to introduce machines to postmark and cancel mail items. There were two main types of machine; a) a feed, cancel, exit machine, and b) mechanically assisted hand cancellers which cancelled the stamp only. However, to get to the point where machines could assist with the increasing number of mail items being processed, an effective solution had to be identified, evaluated, tested and selected. To this end, the London General Post Office between 1857 and 1912 tested eighteen machines, many of which were of non-British manufacture.

The collection offered in this sales illustrates, through postal history items, most of the early trials undertaken by the London General Post Office using machines from; Pearson Hill, Charles Rideout, Azemar (Hinrichsen), Sloper, Hoster, Ethridge, Malin, International (Hey - Dolphin), Imperial, Empire, Bickerdike, Boston, Colombia, Krag and Wilkinson. Because many of these trials were short lived, much of the material available is scarce and in some cases rare with one of less than a handful known.

Several of the cancels hold iconic status in the sphere of postmark collecting, none more so than the Pearson Hill 'Opera Glass'. It is not the rarest of the machine cancels, with there being eight recorded examples on cover, but it is the most sought after by far. Similarly, the Pearson Hill 'Twin Circle' Trial Machine cancel, sometimes referred to as the 'Creswell' cancellation, which was the first type of parallel motion used, is also highly coveted on account of its visual appeal.

The better known London cancels produced by Hill's second machine are more prevalent in number, but are extremely popular due to their visual appeal, albeit they are relatively speaking uncommon. The better known trial machine postmarks, such as the Hoster, have an almost cult following especially for the rare examples, which also have other attractive traits. The very rare 'Bedford St. Bow WC' Hoster and the 'Dot Matrix' Hoster Trial Machine cancellations, along with the 'N.B.P. Hoster', offers the collector an unusual visual spectacle coupled with scarcity. Some of the Codes are extremely hard to locate. The Malin cancel is as elusive to find on cover as it is to find information in the British Postal Archives about the machine and its use.

As well as circulated covers, there are two proof impressions of the 1897 'Imperial Victoria Jubilee Flag' which are seldom seen or offered for sale. The 'Empire Machine England Flag' Trial cancellation is the postmark which reflects a patriotic era. It is one of just five known and dated on the last day of the trial.

This sale provides the postmark collector and postal historian with an exciting opportunity to acquire material not always readily available and which tells an important story in the early development of postal mechanisation.

The earliest Experimental and Machine Postmarks obliterating Postage Stamps Jerry H. Miller & Karl Louis

The aim of this summary is a short description of the existing earliest Experimental Machines and Postmarks including a listing of recorded stamps, pieces and covers of the rarest postmarks and their dates of use, based on the research of Jerry H. Miller and the Karl Louis Card Index.

Historical Background

Soon after the introduction of prepaid postage and use of the first postage stamp in Britain in 1840, the postal authorities recognised a need for clear, clean and legible postmarks of the ever-increasing volume of mail. The Victorian Period in Britain was a dynamic one and is often referred to as the 'Period of Industrial Revolution', where communications by mail were important aspects. In 1853, Pearson Hill, son of Rowland Hill, became involved with the postmarking deficiencies existent in the British postal system. By 1857 he had developed and patented the first 'Rapid Postmarking Machine'!

Between 1857 and 1912, the London General Post Office tested and/or evaluated no fewer than 18 machines.

The Pearson Hill First Machine

Pearson Hill's First Machine (Fig. 1) was treadle-operated and could post-mark about +/- 100 letters per minute. This was considerably slower than an experienced postal clerk who could hand-stamp mail at about 200 strikes/minute, although a machine's durability and stamina surpassed that of a clerk. Demonstration of Hill's machine to the postal authorities took place on 17 September 1857.

The following items are recorded, all dated 17th. September 1857: 1857, 1d., HG, MF singles off piece or cover.

J(?)C on cover to Alton, Hants (stamp does not belong to this envelope),

Machine 'A'




Fig. 2. Obliteration die used for the Pearson Hill's First Machine demonstration on 17 September 1857.

A few days later, on 21 September 1857 a commercially built Machine 'A' with a rubber die was delivered to the Post Office. On 25 September 1857 the Post Office commenced its full day (day and night) trial of the machine (Fig. 2). Postmarks on loose stamps, pieces and covers are recorded to 17 February 1858.

Several codes were used, placed above the date, which may or may not have reflected adjustments or alterations to the machine during this experimental test phase. Except for the code 'A' all other codes are very rare. The following items/dates are recorded:

Machine 'B' - The 'Opera Glass'

The early stamping dies were manufactured of rubber and could wear, resulting in potentially illegible markings. So, Pearson Hill improved his first field-test machine into a second type, which now used a metal die (Fig. 4). This type of obliteration became known as the 'Opera Glass' and is recorded to be used between 21 March 1858 until 23 April 1858. The following items are recorded:

Machine 'C' - The 'Twin Circle'

Typical for postmark impressions of Hill's Machine 'A' and Machine 'B' were the offset markings on the reverse of the letters. In an attempt to eliminate those Pearson Hill constructed a technical modified Machine 'C' which used a less ornate postmarking die consisting of two adjacent 19mm diameter dated and coded single-circle dials. Known trial use was between 8 March 1858 and 18 March 1858 with the following items recorded:

Machine 'C' – The 'Single Circle' used for Transit and Arrival markings only

The 'Twin Circle' for postage stamp obliteration was soon discarded by Pearson Hill. He modified the 'Twin Circle' to 'One Circular Dater' dies, which were now used singly to apply service postmarks to incoming and outgoing mail.

Experimental Machines from various suppliers

Between January 1858 and 1901 a larger number of Postmarking Machines from various suppliers were tested:

Charles Rideout, a retired post office surveyor, supplied two machines for testing in 1858 and 1859

Pearson Hill introduced a new 'Parallel Motion Stamping Machine'. Testing continued from 14 May 1858 to 1860. Charles Rideout improved machines were tested between October 1866 and July 1867.

The Hinrichsen (J.C.Azemar) 'Rapid Postmarking Machine'

Robert Hinrichsen a German Inventor, and his sales representative J.C. Azemar, delivered a 'Rapid Postmarking Machine' to the General Post Office with a postmarking rate of 500-600 pieces of mail per minute. Three primary trials were conducted in 1869, 1871 and 1872.

The by far rarest 'Azemar Postmark' originates from the second trial in January and February 1871 on postal stationery cards having a rectangular dater and an obliterator having '89' in the center. This obliteration is also exceedingly rare with the following pieces and post cards recorded:

The 'Hoster Machine'

In 1883, Albert Hoster, a German, sold between 1883 – 1886 the Post Office eight 'Hoster Postmarking Machines'. Field trials and usage years 1883 – 1893 produced a number of different origin markings.



The 'Malin Machine'

Between 30 September 1890 and 12 February 1891, a trial was held with the 'Malin Machine'. Little is found today in British Postal Archives. This experimental cancellation turned out to be exceedingly rare with the following items recorded:

More Machines tested

Further Machines tested were the 'Hey-Dolphin Machine' in August and September 1893 (very rare), the 'Imperial Machine' (two proof impressions examples known, but not processed for regular mail), the 'Bickerdike Machine' (1897), the 'Empire Machine' showing a 'Flag' postmark tested on four days in March 1898 for one hour each day only (exceedingly rare) and the 'Boston Machine' (1898).

After the 'Victorian Period', a number of other machines were tested and accepted for field use by the British Post Office. However, the machines and marking described and listed above reflect the 'classical period' for experimental postmarking machines in Britain.

The W.E. Oliver correspondence 1841-43

A tale of two Scottish gentlemen in Australia

Georg Stoermer

Over the last few months I acquired a couple of covers from Scotland to Australia in 1843. I had never seen anything like the latest acquisition shown in Figure 1 and had to find out more about the addressee "William Elliot Oliver" and why he (Oliver) went to Australia.

It is an entire cover from Edinburgh, Scotland, to W.E. Oliver, Sydney, New South Wales (NSW), re-addressed to Moreton Bay with eight examples of a plate 25 Penny Red, the world's third stamp, according to the Scott catalog. The letter was sent from Edinburgh Feb. 13, 1843, and according to Klaus Weis, president of DASV (the German postal history club), was probably sent with the barque *Reflector*, departing London on Feb. 14. The *Reflector* arrived at Sydney on June 30, after 135 days. The letter is canceled "PAID/LONDON SHIP LETTER/ 15 FE 15 /1843" in red on the front. Klaus also tells me the cover was taxed local port tax 3d, plus 4d NSW inland postage to Moreton Bay, total 7d, payable by the addressee.

Karl Louis, expert on classic British stamps, has kindly provided me with copies of the 11 Oliver covers from his famous card index. A selection of his material is shown along with this article.

The letters were all sent by family members in Scotland. All are ship letters with the usual 8d postage to Australia.

Note: The cover front derives from the famous "W.E.Oliver, care of John Irvine, Commissary General, Sydney, New South Wales" correspondence from Hawick in Scotland. William Elliot Oliver grew up in Scotland. He decided to emigrate, together with his cousin and business partner James Borthwick, to New South Wales in 1841 to establish a sheep farm. Since there was less competition for land in Moreton Bay (later Queensland), this became his main focus. Later letters from this correspondence were re-addressed to Moreton Bay, and from 1843 directly addressed to "Buaraba, Moreton Bay". After eight hard years of business in Australia, W.E.Oliver returned to Scotland as a rich man and never returned to Australia again. The 1841, 2d. blue trial plate "Gutter Sheet of 2 x 12"

Due to the delay of finishing the new printing plate of the 1841, 2d. "with white lines", a small trial plate of 12 impressions without corner letterings was made to print the specimens urgently required for the distribution of the Postal Notices to announce the new 1d. red and 2d. blue stamp issue of 1841.

The small sheets of 12 were provisionally printed on the large sized "Small Crown" watermark paper that was normally used to print from steel plates of 240 stamps. The sheet margins of the few surviving 2d. blue trial sheets of 12 were mainly between 5-10 mm wide. It is not known, if the large sized "Small Crown" printing sheet was divided first into small paper bits of approx. 9.5×10.0 cm and then printed individually on the small trial plate of 12 stamps, or if the large sheet of 240 was shifted intact between each individual print run underneath the small trial plate, leaving a "gutter" between the small sheets of 10-12 mm for a separation after the printing was finished.

A new Find may shed some more light to the question of the paper separation ,before or after the printing. The upcoming Corinphila auction scheduled for the end of November 2024 will offer a 2d. blue trial sheet of 12 showing very characteristic 'uneven' edges of the sheet margins. When Karl got the sheet consigned, he checked his Card Index to see if he may find the original adjoining trial sheet. He was lucky to spot the formerly adjoining 2d. blue trial sheet of 12, forming a (separated) "pair of 2d. small trial sheets" with a 11 mm "Gutter Margin" in between.

This find may indicate, that the small trial plate was struck 15 times (five horizontal rows of three small sheets of 12) on the large sized intact printing sheet originally designed for 240 stamps. And then the 15 small sheets were separated between the horizontal and vertical gutters. Corinphila will offer the upper small sheet. The lower small sheet was offered in a Phillips auction in February 1990. Perhaps the two 2d. small sheets can be "reunited" in the nearer or longer future, if the Phillips 1990 sheet has not been split up since. It would make a glorious album page with a re-joined "Gutter Sheet of 2 x 12"!
