

1892: 1½ d. red-brown, surcharged by manuscript red ink to reduce to 1 d. by deleting "HALFPENNY", used from Lagos to Cameroon, dated 8 September 1892, endorsed "Woermann Line" (German steamer) and also "Postlagernd" (to be collected), cancelled by "LAGOS / W. AFRICA" cds in black, with "KAMERUN" arrival also in black dated 12 December 1892. Corner crease lower left and minor rubs to both sides which are not obvious and do not detract. Rare early example. Mail to Cameroon is also not common. Cert RPSL (2017) which states "..red ink matches the ink on postally used cards with deletion applied after the obliteration.." and "...is not an official issue."

Note: Notwithstanding the RPSL opinion, the author of the definitive book on Nigerian postal stationery; published by RPSL (2023), states; "Even though a lot of questions about these cards have been raised, it still seems plausible that manuscript surcharges were indeed issued, at least for the

single cards."

1892: 1½ d. red-brown, surcharged by manuscript red ink to reduce to 1 d. by deleting "HALF", used from Lagos to Hamburg, Germany, dated 26 July 1893, cancelled by "LAGOS / W. AFRICA" single circle in black, with a faint "PAID / LIVERPOOL / BR. PACKET" in red dated 28 July 1893, partially overstruck with arrival "HAMBURG" double circle dated 29 July 1893 in black. A fine and rare card. Cert RPSL (2017) which states "..red ink matches the ink on postally used cards with

deletion applied after the obliteration.." and "...is not an official issue."

Note: The author of the definitive reference book on Nigerian postal stationery (published by RPSL in 2023) believes it is entirely feasible that manuscript surcharges were issued.

The Eye-Catching Nature of Surcharge

These Lagos 1892 11/2 d. Red-brown Stationery Cards, which have been surcharged by manuscript red ink to reduce to 1 d. by deleting "HALFPENNY", have always been eye-catching. Postally used examples are found with differing thickness of the pen stroke and there are a handful which have the "HALF" only, of "HALFPEN-NY", crossed out. The illustrated example, which is one of the latter, comes with an RPSL certificate which indicates the opinion that these were not an official issue. However, in his book, 'The Postal Stationery of

Nigeria', Peter Hørlyck, who had a large sample of cards used, unused and cancelled to order, states; "Even though a lot of questions about these cards have been raised, it still seems plausible that manuscript surcharges were indeed issued, at least for the single cards." This example was endorsed "Woermann Line" (German steamer) and also "Postlagernd" (to be collected) and was sent to Cameroon. Notwithstanding the varying opinions, they remain eye-catching. Part of 'The Peter Hørlyck Collection of Postal Stationery for Nigeria, Cameroon and Sudan'.





Late usage being after Lagos had been incorporated into Southern Nigeria. Tone spots, soiling apparent, care worn and imperfections, otherwise in fine condition for such a large format envelope. One of four essays of similar design prepared by De La Rue in an unsuccessful bid to win the contract to produce cards for the Oil Rivers Protectorate. One example is in the National Postal Museum also dated '23 Nov. 92', the other two are dated 21 December 1892. It was one of a large number bought at the Post Office on the African coast by an officer in the merchant service, who thought they would acquire a high value from a philatelist's point of view. They did not so he kept them by him until his death when his exor tried to get face value refunded. 

The Rise in Popularity of the "SPECIMEN"



The reference book we always reach for when handling colony Specimen material is; 'Specimen Stamps of the Crown Colonies', which was published by the Royal Philatelic Society London in 1976 (supplement 1984). The author, Marcus Samuel (1904–1997), was an eminent British philatelist, who was recognized as an expert in the specimen and revenue stamps of Britain and the British Commonwealth. Interestingly, Samuel assembled a vast collection of specimens.

imen stamps before they were widely collected. Apparently, he began collecting in 1924 when his father acquired a collection which contained a large sample of specimens. His father, not interested in the specimens, asked Samuel to sort the collection and remove all stamps which were not overprinted, allowing him to keep the specimens as a reward for his efforts.

Of course, today specimen stamps are highly collectable and often attract significant bids when rare or unusual examples come to market. The 'I R / SPECIMEN" overprint on the featured Niger Coast Protectorate 1895 1 d. vermilion, Postal Stationery Card, was recorded by Samuel in the London Philatelist (Vol. 65 No. 768, pg. 195). He stated it was used on a set of British stamps current around 1891. Samuel suggested it was used by the Inland Revenue for items in their official reference collection and added: 'This view is strengthened by the discovery of the same two* overprints on

an 1892 British Post Card overprinted for use in the Niger Coast protectorate, because it is known that temporary assistance was, at times, afforded by the Inland Revenue Department to Dependencies aboard, and that British postage stamps and postal stationery were appropriated for that purpose." The attention and detail Samuel brought to the specimen stamps provided context which has been instrumental in making specimen material popular. He also worked with stationery expert Alan Huggins

in authoring the go to reference book; 'Specimen Stamps and Stationery of Great Britain, which was published by GB Philatelic Publications Ltd in 1980, and which they both won the Crawford Medal in 1981. 'Samuel used the word 'two" because he believed the "I R" and "SPECIMEN" were separate overprints. Part of The Peter Horlyck Collection of Postal Stationery for Nigeria, Cameroon and Sudan'.

The Registered Stationery Envelope, Retailer and Stamp Dealer



This British Protectorate Oil Rivers 1892 registered stationery envelope franked with a 1893 surcharged 1 s. violet handstamp on 2 d. grey-green & carmine sent from Warri, Nigeria to London brings two noteworthy philatelic names from the past together. When it arrives on the auction stage in November this year it will combine the renowned British West Africa collector and author John Sacher and the famous dealer Frank Godden. The envelope comes with the provenance of John Sacher (1940 to 2016), who was a director for the famous British retailer Marks & Spencer, and the great grandson of Michael Marks, one of the founders of the company. Sacher certainly was no ordinary philatelist. He clocked up 50 years of membership, and two of those as the president, of the Royal Philatelic Society London and and was a member of the West Africa Study Circle, the Collector's Club New York, the US Philatelic Classics Society, the Postal History Society, the France & Colonies Philatelic Society, and the International Society for Portuguese Philately.

The envelope is addressed to Frank Godden at 391 The

Strand, London. Godden, as well as being well known for producing rather nice leatherbound philatelic albums, was a renowned philatelist and stamp dealer. Christened 'Lewis Sidney Frank Godden' (1877 to 1954) but known as Frank Godden, he set up a philatelic business in The Strand, London in 1912, which his son, who was also called Jack Godden, joined and together they produced the monthly 'Godden's Gazette' from 1933 until the 1970s. Frank Godden Senior was considered to be an expert in writing-up and presenting collections, and was a founder member of the British Philatelic Association (BPA). His organisation skills were also legendary, which he put to good effect in architecting the philatelic section of the British Empire Exhibition in 1924, as well as being a British Commissioner for many international exhibitions. Godden signed the Roll of Distinguished Philatelists in 1946. Philatelic Oil Rivers

he Niger Coast which, back in the 1890s, was a British Protectorate known as 'Oil Rivers', is now modern-day Nigeria. The name 'Oil Rivers' came from the trade of palm oil which was transported along the rivers through the areas of Calabar and the Niger Delta. Palm oil was a significant commodity and the British had commercial reasons to have an interest, as well as a post office, in this region during Victorian times. Primarily based in Old Calabar, a consular postal service was arranged from 1891, becoming an authorized post office by 1892. Stamps were issued in

the same year utilizing the six Great Britain Jubilee values ½ d. to 1 s. All overprinted 'BRITISH PROTECTORATE OIL RIVERS' in black.

According to records, from almost the first issue of stocks, certain values persistently ran-dry, which conveniently gave rise to what is termed the 'Provisional values' that have the additional surcharge overprinted in a variety of colors, It is thought today the claim that stocks were depleted was in fact an excuse to justify the production of surcharged stamps for collectors of purely philatelic origins. Whether the

provisional incarnations were oiling a cog on some philatelic river or not, they are fun, and these adhesives are highly collectable. The featured unused example is SG 41, listed as Niger Coast, Oil Rivers Protectorate, 1893 'Old Calabar' 10 shilling on 5d. dull purple & blue, surcharged Type 12 in vermilion. The catalogue value for an unused example is £6'500 (2024 edition of the SG British Commonwealth catalogue) and fine examples always attract strong interest at auction, Part of 'The Peter Hørlyck Collection'. 

Longji Emergency Issue

The ironic aspect of the Provisionals from the Longji Emergency issue is they were contrary to a repeated directive not to create provisional stamps.

However, the postmaster had limited options when on 19 May 1911, the post office in Longji ran out of 10 Pf. stamps while franking a large quantity of mail which was to be dispatched on the mail steamer Badenia. The solution was to vertically bisect 20 Pf. stamps to enable the mail to be dispatched. As a way of proving these were a genuine official


