
This Sheet, 35 inches by 23 inches, weighing One Ounce, is charged as a SINGLE Letter, whilst the accompanying Letter, weighing 7 grains, or under the 60th part of One Ounce, is charged as a DOUBLE

N.B.-In France, Germany, and throughout Europe, the Postage is charged by WEIGHT.

#### ANOMALIES.

- "The delays of the threepenny post are notorious. A letter posted at Chelsea after 4 p.m. to pass to Brompton, three quarters of a mile, occupies 22 hours in delivery, and travels nearly 8 miles. A letter written at Uxbridge, after the close of the Post Office on Friday injet, would not be delivered at Gravesend, edistance of less than 40 miles, earlier than Tuesday morning. 'If two letters,' says Mr. Hill, 'were put into the proper district 'receiving-houses in London, between five and six o'clock in the evening, one addressed to 'Highgate, the other to Wolverhampton (which lies 120 miles further along the same road), 'the Wolverhampton letter would be delivered first.' Dr. Lardner shows that under some circumstances it takes longer to convey a letter from Hampeone in the Lordon days for "circumstances it takes longer to convey a letter from Hammersmith to London than from London to Bristol or Birmingham: the one, unless put in before four in the afternoon, will not be delivered till noon the next day; the other, put in at a quarter before seven, will be delivered at nine or ten."—London and Westminster Review.
- "A few illustrations of the present rates of postage are worth producing. The last entry of the index to the postage-report gives an amusing example of the vagaries of postage charges. It stands thus—'Zeal South and Honiton—a four-ounce packet from Exert to 'South Zeal, eighteen miles, would cost one penny; if sent to Honiton, sixteen miles, it would cost six shillings and eightpence.' The inhabitants of Renfrew represented, in a petition last Session, that if they posted 'a three-ounce letter to go to Lochwinnock, four—ten miles distant, it would cost a penny; but if the same letter were addressed to 'Pollockshaws, half the distance, or seven miles, it would be charged four shillings.' Different charges are made on letters of the same sort carried to the same place, This depends on the luck of the hour at which they are posted. Two Kingston-upon-Thames letters are lying before us—threepence postage was paid on the one and eightpence on the other; the difference of charge arising solely from the different hours, at which they were posted. #### NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC.

GENERAL POST OFFICE, APRIL 28TH, 1840.

The Lords of the Treasury having fixed the 6th of May next for the issue of Postage Stamps; on and after that day all Letters written on Stamped Paper, or inclosed in Stamped Covers, or having Stamps affixed to them, the Stamps in every such case being equal in value or amount to the rates of Postage now chargeable on such letters if pre-paid, will pass free of postage in whatever part of the United Kingdom they may be posted.

In those cases where the value of stamps on the letter is less than the amount of postage to which it would be now liable, if pre-paid, the letter will be charged double the amount of such difference on delivery. An inland letter, for example, weighing more than half-an-ounce, and not exceeding an ounce, if bearing

only a penny stamp, will be charged two-pence on delivery.

The same regulation applies to letters pre-paid by money, where the full and proper rate of postage

has not been paid in advance.

Stamps may be used for "Printed Votes" and "Proceedings in Parliament;" if the Stamps, however, should be less in value than the proper rate of postage to which these documents are subject, only

the difference, and not double the difference, is to be charged.

Stamps may also be used on Foreign, Colonial, and Ship Letters, &c., outwards. If any letter, however, addressed to places beyond sea, shall bear an insufficient number of stamps, it will be sent to the Dead Letter Office, to be returned in all practicable cases, to the writer. Stamps are not permitted to be used on letters arriving in the United Kingdom from the Colonies or Foreign Countries. In such cases, therefore, letters will be chargeable with the same rates as they would be if not bearing stamps.

All these regulations will be applicable to Newspapers in those cases where they are liable to postage. It must be distinctly understood that it is optional with the public either to use stamps, or to forward

their letters, &c., pre-paid or un-paid, as at present.

The instructions issued in December and on the 4th February last, remain in full force; the only alteration being, that the stamps are permitted to be used in certain cases instead of the postage being paid in money.

1840: Perkins Bacon engine-turned background Trial finally selected in 1840 for the Line Engraved 1 d. and 2 d. adhesive stamps, plate proof impression in black on India paper (143 x 225 mm). Originally designed for a central band for a specimen banknote Perkins Bacon had submitted to the Bank of England (circa 1822) with a view to obtaining the contract for printing the bank notes. This is the Proof printing actually illustrated in the Stanley Gibbons Specialised catalogue, November 2020, on page 60 Gi DP9a = £ 30'000.

Note: The original 19th. century proof printings exist with various engraved markings outside the double frame line at top left (or bottom right): 'Page 123', '3' or without engraving. The earliest proof printings submitted to the Bank of England were without an engraved note. The proof printings with 'Page 123' (as offered here) is the 1827 published in London example from Transaction of the society for the encouragement of Arts, Manufactures and Commerce. This state of the printing plate was also used for the 6th. Edition of Thomas Joplin's book "An Essay of the General Principles and Present Practices of banking in England and Scotland (1826). In later years, the engraving 'Page 123' was removed leaving only the '3' (of 123) visible. Thomas Joplin was was the Chief Officer of the Provincial Bank of Ireland and he ordered his plates from Perkins, Fairman and Heath (later renamed Perkins Bacon) beginning in 1820.



Remarks: Perforated stamps from this sheet, which were later attributed to the so-called "Government Trial Perforation 14" were first reported in 1910 in a marginal block of four, JK/KL, by Charles Nissen in "The British Philatelist". In 1910 Charles Nissen stated in regard of the new find: "We shall be glad if someone, more conversant with the line-engraved series of our stamps, will assist in explaining what to us is at present somewhat of a puzzle". Some years later a few more singles or pairs came to light and have been spotted in the most renowned collections of their times:

Visitors attending the Royal Silver Jubilee Exhibition, organised by the RPSL in May 1935, saw two blocks of four (of which one was the original 1910 find JK/KL), a pair and a single.

A block of four lettered ED / FE, ws offered in the Ronald A. G. Lee collection by Stanley Gibbons in 1970, this block adjoins the block of 28 offered here.

A pair, GD-GE, also formerly adjoined this block of 28 and to the two singles HD and HE described below, was offered by Harmers of London in the Per Gjerding collection in 1956.

Two singles HD and HE, also formerly adjoining to the block of 28 offered here, were sold in 1929 by Charles Nissen for £ 7.10s. to Lady Joicey (HD) and HE was sold in the Wane collection by Harmers in November 1941 for £ 18.

Having observed that the perforations on this block were not consistent with comb-perforation equipment available to Somerset House, Simpson & Sargent summarised the situation in their 2006 handbook as follows: "Apart from ruling out Government trial perforation, almost everything else about these perforated stamps remains a mystery. Whatever the original manufacturer's motive in applying the perforation 14 may have been, that person must surely be deriving much quiet amusement at the enduring credulity of philatelists". A clandestine perforation 14, that became a curious chapter in British Philatelic History! For further reading see "Pick of the Pack", GB Journal July/August 2025, pages IX and X).




