#### FRANCO-AMERICAN TRANSATLANTIC SHIPMAIL

The collection on hand presents a wide spanning, but at the same time an in-depth study of the transatlantic mail connections between France and the United States and vice versa.

It starts with mail post the War of Austrian Succession and the Napoleonic Wars. The collection includes pre-contract mail prior to 1840 and shows the activity of commercial vessels and pioneer steamships conveying the mail overseas. The dominating role of the Cunard line in the 1840s and 1850s and also the importance of its competitors, the Ocean line, the Hérout & de Handel line, the Collins line, and the Havre line, are presented. The consecutive new US - France Postal Convention becoming valid in April 1857 was the basis for several contracts with US, French, British, and German shipping lines which enabled a steady mail flow across the pond. The collection ends with 1870/1874 interim non-treaty mail.

The focus of the collection are the voyages of the different steamship vessels under contract. First and last journeys are documented as well as uncompleted crossings due to damage or storm. Wrecked ships such as the 'Winfield Scott', or those abandoned by crew and passengers such as the 'L'Amérique' or the 'Europe', are included in the scope of the collection.

The material included in this collection was selected for short-living rates or contracts and originates from well-known philatelist provenances as John Boker, Richard F. Winter, Hugh Feldman, Stephen C. Walske, and Jack Blanc. This collector included also items with an eminent 'pre-shipping' postal history such as covers carried by Pony Express or the first Airmail of the world, the Ballons Montés out of the besieged Paris during the Franco-Prussian war. Shipmail during the American Civil War is included with blockade runner items and two covers of the Captain Burckmyer correspondence ingoing to as well as leaving Charleston.


As to be expected, much of the material is prephilatelic or stampless, documenting the large variability of exchange and postal treaty handstamps which makes shipmail postal history so rewarding. The mail with adhesives selected for this collection show US and French frankings on an above-average condition and would grace every collection of French or American Shipmail.

6007 The British Contintental Blockade; 1808 (May 12): Unpaid Entire letter from Morristown, New Jersey to Condom, Gers, a captured letter showing on reverse the censorship manuscript note "opened at Sea by H. B. M. ship Saturn", arrival in France at "42 / GUÉRANDE" (Salles 78).
Note: The HMS Saturn was involved in the fight against American and French vessels on the Atlantic during the blockade of the continent and the War of 1812 between the United Kingdom and the United States. In March 1808 it was involved in action between a British squadron and the two French frigates Italienne and Seine off the port of Lorient.

Note: According to the census of 1847 issue covers to France by Steven C. Walske, the noted authority on U.S.-French mails, only two covers are recorded that were carried by private ship to France. Regarding these covers, Walske writes: "Non-contract ships also carried small amounts of mail to France, and private ship rates applied to this type of mail in both the United States and France. In the United States, the 1845 inland rates applied: 5 c. per half ounce if sent less than 300 miles, and 10 c. if sent over 300 miles. France assessed a one décime (2 c.) ship fee plus variable inland rates until July 31, 1849. After that, collections in France were 3 décimes per 7.5 grams to the port of arrival or 6 décimes to other parts of France." The other cover, illustrated in Walske's article, also comes from the Octavius Yates correspondence.

In July 1853 she was sold to the Pacific Mail Steamship Company and served the San Francisco - Panama route. Loaded with over 300 passengers and crew and a reported \$1 million in gold bullion (some accounts but the figure at \$2 million), the Winfield Scott departed San Francisco on December 1, 1853. The next evening Captain Simon F. Blunt chose to pass through the Santa Barbara Channel to save time, but in a dense fog crashed into Middle Anacapa at full speed at 11:00 in the evening. The Captain immediately sent out a boat to see where he could land the passengers. The purser reported that a little island separate from the main one was nearest and that the passengers could be placed on it for the night. The next morning the passengers, some mail, and the treasure were taken onto the main island. The large group camped on the island for up to a week. The 'California' saw smoke from the passengers' fires and rescued the women. It returned on December 9 and, in heavy swells, removed the rest of the passengers, leaving the ship's company on the island who attempted to save mail, baggage, furniture and some machinery from the wreck. On the 10th the steamer 'Southerner' hove into sight and landed provisions for the officers and crew. Up to that time, the Winfield Scott had not been broken up by the action of the waves. When the Republic arrived the next day, however, the midship was sunk and Captain Blunt gave up all hope of saving her or getting her off the ledge. The crew went out to the ship and saved what they could before boarding the Republic for San Francisco. Some time later, the side-wheeler toppled off the ledge and sank. (Taken from https://www.nps.gov/) Thus, obviously the mail was rescued not in one go. This cover was taken by the 'Republic' first back to San Francisco and from there on 29 December to Panama where it arrived on 14 January 1854. The 'Ohio' brought it from Aspinwall / Colon to New York arriving there on 29 January and where it was picked up by the 'Atlantic' of the Collins line.

1874 (April 4): Envelope from New York to Paris, a **wetted ship wreck cover sent with the 'Amérique' of the French Line**, endorsed "*Per Amérique*", bearing 1870/71 10 c. brown(Scott 161), tied by geometrical Star cancel, "NEW YORK" despatch cds in red and clear octagonal BREST entry cds in blue (April 27) alongside, charged with handstruck '5' décimes due. Non-contract steamship mail had to be paid with 10 cents per 1/2 oz. in the July 1864 rate while the corresponding French rate of July 1871 was 50 centimes per 10 grams.

Note: L'Amérique was an unlucky ship. She had been built in 1864 at St. Nazaire as 'Imperatrice Eugenie'. The vessel had been employed for service to Mexico in the late 1860s. Once Emperor Nappleon III abdicated, the ship was renamed 'Atlantique' in 1870. The years later, she was reworked from a sidewheel paddle steamer to a screw propeller. Again she was renamed as 'Amérique' and operated on the Le Havre - New York route of the French LIne. In 14 April 1874, Amerique was abandoned by crew and passengers in full storm at approximately 100 miles of Brest. The pumps had been insufficient to evacuate the water which rushed into the ship resulting in 6 - 8 feet water in the machine room and coal bunkers. The passengers and the crew were rescued by three other ships in short time. Finally, the vessel was located, still afloat, by the English steamers 'Spray' and 'Auburn', towed until Plymouth on 18 April, then returned after repair to Le Havre on 2 May by her own means. The contemporary journal news do not give any information about the mail bags on the 'Amérique', however one has to assume that the mail was still on the vessel when it was towed in to Plymouth.
