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Foreword · Vorwort

JP Gough's legendary UPU collection: a milestone in the world of philately

Jamie is one of the most-followed individuals in the philatelic community, across disciplines, leveraging his appeal as one of the most influential collectors, exhibitors, judges, writers and presenters. His long career as a competitive exhibitor since 1966, along with his public oratory have built his worldwide reputation and created a strong following among philatelists. Now that Jamie has decided to sell his 'UPU' collection, he has chosen a concept jointly with Heinrich Köhler in Germany and Corinphila in Switzerland.

We are many who have learned from Jamie's doctrine about competive exhibing and multipled our performance.

Jamie Gough ist eine Ikone in der Welt der Philatelie. Wenn es um das Sammeln, Ausstellen, Bewerten, Schreiben und Moderieren geht, sucht man seinesgleichen. Sein Ruf ist nicht nur exzellent, sondern auch global, aufgebaut durch eine beeindruckende Ausstellerkarriere, die bereits 1966 ihren Anfang nahm, und durch seine einzigartigen rhetorischen Fähigkeiten. Nun hat Jamie eine bahnbrechende Entscheidung getroffen: Er verkauft seine "UPU"-Sammlung und vertraut dabei auf die Expertise von Heinrich Köhler in Deutschland und Corinphila in der Schweiz.

Viele von uns haben von Jamies Weisheiten über das Ausstellen bei Wettbewerben profitiert und dadurch ihre eigenen Leistungen massiv verbessert.

Seine beiden Philatelic Summit Dokumente sind längst Legende. Darin teilt er seine Erfahrungen, Gedanken und Erkenntnisse über die Entwicklung des philatelistischen Ausstellungswesens. Für uns gehören diese Beiträge zu den wichtigsten Veröffentlichungen über Tendenzen im Ausstellungswesen über mehrerer Jahrzehnte und die zugrunde liegenden Philosophien – inklusive ihrer, wie er selbst betont, manchmal unbeabsichtigten Folgen.

Jamie's two Philatelic Summit Papers have become legendary thanks to him sharing his experiences as well as his thoughts and experiences about the evolution of philatelic exhibiting. We claim that Jamie's two papers are among the most important in regard of exhibiting, its trends over a few decades and its underlying philosophies (which sometimes create unintended consequences as he points out).

Als einer der bedeutendsten Philatelisten unserer Zeit hat Jamie drei nationale Titel in den USA gewonnen, darunter den National Youth Champion. Während für viele Philatelisten der Gewinn einer internationalen Großgoldmedaille eine Lebensleistung darstellt, hat Jamie bereits über zehn Großgoldmedaillen und vier Internationale Grand Prix gewonnen.

As one of philately's most notable influencers of our time. **Iamie** has accumulated three USA national titles (including the National Youth Champion). And while for many philatelists, winning international Large Gold medal is a lifetime achievement, Jamie has won more than 10 Large Gold medals and four International Grand Prix's.



In the philatelic summit series, Jamie's two contributions are legendary and sought after publications: #1 (2012) with the title The Ever-Changing Paradigm of Philatelic Exhibiting and #5 (2014) with the title Perspectives on Exhibiting (Generally).

Jamie won his second USA Championship at Stampshow Champions of Champion, Milwaukee, in 2013. Being presented the trophy by two APS Presidents: Stephen Reinhard and Wade Saadi RDP.

Almost all of Jamie's collecting has taken a "first time, pioneering approach" to philatelic exhibiting based on broad themes. We can make that statement even as far back as his Irish Postal History, 1690-1926. When he started his Irish postal history collection, philately generally accepted that postal history was stampless material with manuscript markings or handstamps. But Jamie included distinctive Irish cancellations on GB stamps right into the independence movement (1916-1921) and the first stamps of Ireland. He

Fast alle von Jamies Sammlungen zeichnen sich durch einen "pionierhaften Ansatz" aus, der auf breiten Themen basiert. Das zeigt sich schon bei seiner Sammlung zur irischen Postgeschichte von 1690 bis 1926. Als er diese begann, war in der Philatelie allgemein anerkannt, dass Postgeschichte primär Material mit handschriftlichen Tax- und Leit-Vermerken oder Handstempeln umfasste. Jamie aber bezog auch charakteristische irische Stempel

was actually criticized for doing that because this range included prestamp, as well as stamps and then proofs and mint stamps of the early Irish independence period - all part of the country's story.

Then came postage due stamps of the world on cover. Jamie was told that doing the world was not possible in ten frames (or eight). But he developed the different postal history reasons for postage due as the exhibit's structure. And that made the worldwide approach intellectually acceptable.

Then came Jamie's UPU collection along the lines of UPU rules, regulations and rates. Again, he was told that worldwide was not possible until the establishment found that his items were all "eye candy" and it became acceptable as the intellectual structure became understood.

Jamie always had to break down resistance to nontraditional approaches through persistence and the selective use of beautiful material while avoiding even close duplication.

We were very proud to publish the 79th EDITION D'OR volume, honouring Jamie and his World Champion exhibit Universal Postal Union ("UPU")

britischen Briefmarken bis Unabhängigkeitsbewegung (1916-1921) und den ersten Briefmarken Irlands mit ein. Dafür wurde er anfangs sogar kritisiert, denn dieser Bereich umfasste sowohl Vorphilatelie als auch die Briefmarkenzeit Probedrucke postfrische und später sowie Briefmarken irischen aus der frühen Unabhängigkeitsphase – allesamt Teil der Geschichte des Landes.

Ein ähnliches Erlebnis hatte er mit seiner Sammlung "Portomarken aus aller Welt auf Briefen". Jamie wurde suggeriert, es sei unmöglich, die ganze Welt in zehn (oder acht) Rahmen unterzubringen. Doch er demonstrierte verschiedene postgeschichtliche Gründe für Portomarken als Ausstellungsstruktur. Damit wurde der weltweite Ansatz intellektuell akzeptabel.

Als drittes folgte Jamies UPU-Sammlung, die auf den Regeln, Vorschriften und Tarifen des Weltpostvereins (UPU) aufbaute. Auch hier wurde ihm gesagt, dass eine weltweite Darstellung nicht möglich sei – bis das Establishment feststellte, dass seine Exponate "eine Augenweide" waren und als intellektuelle Struktur akzeptiert wurden.

And Its Impact on Global Postal Services. EDITION D'OR is a series of books presenting the most beautiful Stamp Collections in the world of its time. The series was inaugurated in 2006 and has now reached its state as The Hall of Fame for the best philatelic collections. This is a comprehensive book with 290 pages from Jamie's collection depicted.









Jamie musste Widerstände gegen unkonventionelle Ansätze immer wieder durch Beharrlichkeit und die selektive Verwendung schönen Materials überwinden, während er gleichzeitig selbst geringfügige Duplikate vermied.

Wir sind sehr stolz darauf, den 79. Band der EDITION D'OR veröffentlicht zu haben, der Jamie und seine Weltmeisterausstellung "Universal Postal Union (UPU) And Its Impact on Global Postal Services" würdigt. Die EDITION D'OR ist eine 2006 ins Leben gerufene Buchreihe, die die schönsten Briefmarkensammlungen der Welt ihrer Zeit präsentiert und mittlerweile den Status einer "Hall of Fame" für die besten philatelistischen Ausstellungssammlungen erreicht hat. Jamie's Beitrag ist ein umfassendes Buch mit 290 Seiten aus seiner Sammlung.

In numerous presentations to philatelic communities, Jamie frequently reverts to one and the same statement. Beauty is a quote to use from Jamie in regard of his selection of items of mail. Beauty and outstanding condition is reflected throughout the collection.

If it is not pretty, it doesn't matter how rare it is, don't use it

As Jamie concurrently is one of our community's strongest and most important influencer, we are proud to have been selected by him to do this sale on his behalf. His collection is already a living legend. The first sale will take place with Heinrich Köhler Auktionshaus in Germany, and the subsequent sale will be with Corinphila Auktionen in Switzerland. This implies that Jamie uses the synergies these two companies have, reaching the largest community of buyers in our enterprise. Thank you Jamie for your confidence in us!

In zahlreichen Vorträgen vor Philatelisten kehrt Jamie immer wieder zu einer Aussage zurück: "Schönheit ist ein Muss in Bezug auf die Auswahl von Poststücken. Schönheit und hervorragender Zustand spiegeln sich in der gesamten Sammlung wider." Er folgt dem Motto:

"Wenn es nicht schön ist, spielt es keine Rolle, wie selten es ist, dann verwende es nicht."

Da Jamie gleichzeitig einer der stärksten und wichtigsten Influencer unserer Philatelie-Gemeinde ist, sind wir stolz darauf, von ihm ausgewählt worden zu sein, den Verkauf seiner Sammlung durchzuführen. Die Sammlung selbst ist bereits legendär. Die erste Versteigerung findet im Auktionshaus Heinrich Köhler in Deutschland statt, die zweite Auktion bei Corinphila Auktionen in der Schweiz im November 2025. Damit nutzt Jamie die Synergien dieser beiden Unternehmen und erreicht die größte Käufergemeinschaft in unserem Markt. Wir sind Jamie für sein Vertrauen in uns sehr dankbar!

1879 (Feb 8): Postal Notice from the Berne Office of the UPU headed "Annexe A La Circulaire Du Bureau International" and dated below, with "Colour Chart" for both the size of future definitive adhesive stamps and their colour uniformity: 5 Centimes in green, 10 centimes and 25 centimes in blue. This Annexe was enacted almost universally thereafter - for example Great Britain 1879/80 values were thus: ½ d. green, 1 d. red and $2\frac{1}{2}$ d. blue; Belgium 1883/84 5 c. green, 10 c. rose and 25 c. blue; Denmark 1884 5 ö. green, 10 ö. red, 25 ö. blue etc. A marvellous item, replete with printed letter from Berne to the London GPO detailing the countries who felt the measure inopportune (France & Colonies, Russia), those that desired to do it but without current facilities (Argentina, Netherlands and Switzerland) and the 20 countries who had agreed the measure. Edge wear to the document. Rare and important piece of philatelic history.





ENCLOSURE OF LETTERS IN PARCELS. SEALING OF FOREIGN PARCELS.

INFORMATION has been received that the addressees of parcels, sent from the United Kingdom to Italy and other Foreign Countries, are frequently fined because of the enclosure of post letters in such parcels contrary to the regulations of the Foreign and Colonial Parcel Post.

The senders of parcels to Foreign Countries and also to the Colonies of the Cape of Good Hope (including British Bechuanaland), Jamaica, Natal, New South Wales, South Australia, Trinidad, Victoria, and Western Australia, are therefore reminded that the enclosing in such parcels of any letter or communication of the nature of a letter is strictly prohibited, and that any violation of this rule renders the parcel liable to detention or the addressee to a fine.

As regards parcels for British Colonies, other than those mentioned above, the enclosing of a letter intended for delivery at the same address as that borne by the parcel is not prohibited.

Foreign Postal Administrations stipulate that parcels shall be securely sealed by means of lead or wax seals. Hitherto parcels not sealed have not been refused admission abroad, but risk of detention or non-delivery is incurred if this precaution is neglected. Parcels for Foreign Countries must therefore be sealed by the senders.



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

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

THROUGH THE EYES OF CORINPHILA'S PHILATELISTS

John Walter Scott of "Scott Catalogue" fame!

The featured 1879 stampless envelope has been sent from the Guatemala General Post Office administration, to New York, USA. It would have been pasted onto a larger envelope or package that accompanied an undelivered parcel being returned to the sender. It's an attractive item and interestingly is addressed to; "Mr J. W. Scott, 146 Fulton St., New York", which is 'the' John Walter Scott, of Scott catalogue fame.

The address is where Scott moved his stamp and coin shop in 1877 and from there he moved just up the road to 163 Fulton Street before he relocated to Broadway in May 1882. Although, John Walter Scott (1845 to 1919) is synonymous the first stamp dealer to sell stamps over \$1000.

As early as 1868 Scott began to catalogue stamps and published 'A Descriptive Catalogue of America and Foreign Postage Stamps, Issued from 1840 to Date'. The following year he produced his first Stamp Album and these innovations led to Scott becoming the leading stamp catalogue producer in America. In late 1885 he sold the rights to his Scott catalogue to a syndicate stock company owned by Henry Lincoln Calman (1863-1935), his older brother Gustav "Gus" Bernhard Calman (1860-1898), and their business partner Henry Collin. They recognised the power of Scott's name and reputation

with American Philately, he was an Englishman who emigrated to America to prospect for gold in 1863. Fortunately for the world of stamps, if not for Scott at the time, he was unsuccessful making his fortune in the field of gold and left California for New York in 1866 where he settled and began his stamp company.

By the time this parcel envelope found its way from Guatemala to Scott's shop in Fulton Street, he had already created the famous Scott Price List, began publishing 'The American Journal of Philately' and staged the first stamp auction – which he held at The Astor Opera House in New York City on 28 May 1870. In fact, in stark contrast to his precious metal prospecting, Scott had considerable success promoting and selling stamps and became a significant dealer in the US. It's a fact that he was

in the field of philately and numismatics because they renamed it the Scott Stamp and Coin Company.

Today, Scott is affectionately known as "The Father of American Philately", and was one of the founding members of the Collectors Club of New York (1896) and served as the president of the American Philatelic Society up until his death (1917 - 1919). In 1941, Scott was added to the American Philatelic Society Hall of Fame, which honors deceased philatelists who have made outstanding contributions to philately. Despite his contributions to the world of stamps, he was still charged 20 cents by the US Postal Service in 1879 because the parcel envelope, ironically, did not have any stamps attached.

THE LONDON PHILATELIST

John Walter Scott: The Father of American Philately

A T SIX IN THE EVENING ON 28 May 1870 at Clinton Hall, 21 Astor Place, New York, the philatelic world saw its first stamp auction. With 270 lots offered, John Walter Scott added a new dimension to the stamp dealing trade. The John Sacher Library was fortunate in recently receiving an original copy of the catalogue generously donated by James Podger FRPSL. This complements the Society's copy of the first London auction sale, also promoted by Scott, on 18 March 1872 at the premises of Sotheby, Wilkinson & Hodge in Wellington Street, off Strand, in London.

So, who was J. W. Scott? It is important to remember that he never wrote his own biography, and that many early documents were lost in a fire at his print shop in 1878. Consequently, much of the printed record of Scott's life is from secondary sources, and subject to the fraillites of memory and opinion.

Early life and move to the United States

John Walter Scott, was born in Walworth, London, on 2 November 1845, moving to the East End of London before his fifth birthday, and there is no evidence of his father in either the census of 1851 or 1861. His baptism certificate dated 22 March 1861 in the Parish of St. Dunstan, Stepney in the East End of London, reports his father John to have been a commercial traveller, deceased. The 1861 census records his mother, Martha Scott, as 'Dependent on Funds'.


